Seventh Annual Art on Fourth Sculptures Installed

Exhibit Includes Works From Regional Artists

KETCHUM, IDAHO – Sculpture on loan from five regional artists has been installed in Town Square and along the Fourth Street Heritage Corridor as part of the city’s seventh annual Art on Fourth Exhibition.

Town Square has *Snow Ghost 1*, a steel tree made by Teresa McHugh of Coeur d’Alene, and *Diligent Usher*, an eight-foot high horse made of antique metalwork by Greg Bartlett of Twin Falls.

Orion, a 10-foot metal human figure by Jacob Novinger of Gooding, is located at Fourth Street and Washington Avenue. Novinger also is the creator of last year’s popular *Toro* on Fourth Street and *Flaming Giraffe* in Town Square.

Leaf Spiral, a steel contemporary sculpture by Boise artist Ken McCall, is at Fourth and Main streets.

Completing the exhibition is *In His Prime*, a life-size bronze deer by Michael Coleman of Provo, Utah, on Fourth between East and Walnut avenues.

“Showcasing talented artists from Idaho and the region is an increasingly important priority of the city,” said Mayor Nina Jonas. “The Art on Fourth exhibition is a constant reminder of the vibrancy of our arts and cultural community and the reasons that Ketchum is a unique and special place to live and visit.”

The Ketchum Arts Commission organized and curated the exhibition, which will remain in place through October. Brochures with more detailed information will soon be available at the Town Square kiosk and adjacent Visitor Center.
