City Council Regulates Dumping Snow in Streets, Right-of-Way

Snow Storage Hampers Emergency Vehicle Access

KETCHUM, Idaho —In order to keep streets wide enough for emergency vehicles, the City Council voted today to stop individuals from dumping snow in the public right-of-way.

"As good as the skiing brought by the recent snowfall has been for the economy, safety is an overriding concern," said City Administrator Suzanne Frick. "Unfortunately, some private citizens and landscaping companies are plowing driveways and dumping the snow in the right-of-way. The additional snow is making some streets too narrow for emergency vehicles to maneuver easily.

In order for the city to widen the streets and eliminate line-of-sight hazards, the city must clear the streets of snow and haul it to the snow storage site off Serenade Lane. Widening the streets will cost the city approximately \$30,000 for one pass through town.

Under the ordinance passed tonight, only snow and ice removed from sidewalks may be deposited in the city right-of-way but not within three feet of a fire hydrant or fire lane. City crews will clear the right of way as they remove snow from streets. Private snow, snow plowed from driveways and walkways, should be stored elsewhere on the property or hauled away, Frick said.

The city will embark on an education and notification process to alert the community of the new requirement. With the cooperation of property owners and landscape companies, city costs for snow removal can be reduced.
